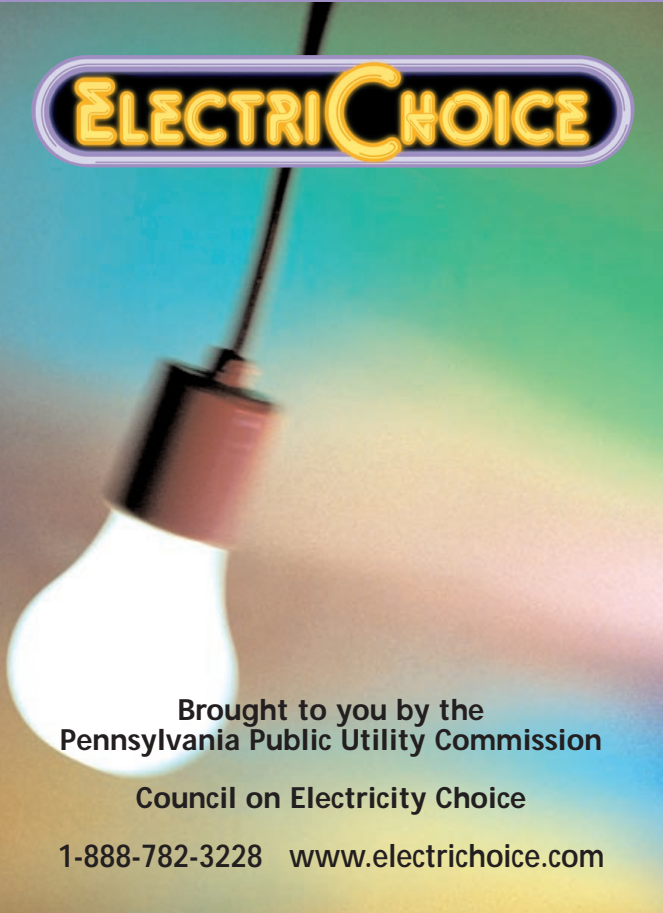

What
You Need
to Know
and
Where to
Find It

Under the Pennsylvania Electric Choice Program, you can choose the company that generates your electricity. You can shop for an electric generation supplier just like you would shop for other services — making a decision based on your own needs and preferences. You can shop for the lowest price. You can shop based on your environmental priorities. Or, you can shop for a company that offers special services. With Electric Choice, the power to choose belongs to you.

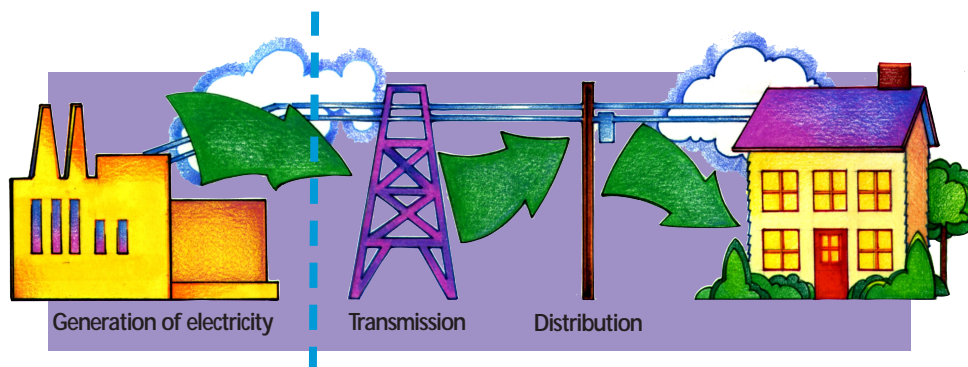

What you need to get started – and where to find it

What: Your price to compare.

This is the price per kilowatt-hour (kWh) your electric distribution company (EDC) will charge for the generation part of your electric service.

Where: You probably received your price to compare in the mail.

If you can't find it, call your local EDC or contact the Electric Choice Program at 1-888-782-3228 or www.electrchoice.com.

What: Electric usage information.

This is your rate class and the average amount of electricity your household uses in a month.

Where: These are on your monthly electric bill.

Look for the graph showing how much electricity you've used over the past 13 months. This will help you figure out your average usage.

What: Electric generation supplier contact information.

Each electric generation supplier must get a license from the Public Utility Commission (PUC) to serve customers in Pennsylvania.

Where: You should have received a list of licensed suppliers in the mail.

You can get an updated list at anytime from the Electric Choice Program 1-888-782-3228 or www.electrchoice.com. For a list of suppliers and their prices, contact the Office of Consumer Advocate (OCA) at 1-717-783-5048 or www.oa.state.pa.us. Information on other pricing resources can be found on the Electric Choice web site.

What: A supplier comparison check list.

This list provides questions to ask suppliers and space to keep track of responses.

Where: A check list is printed at the back of this workbook.

It's easy to compare prices:

- 1 Using the chart on the opposite page, enter the supplier's name on the top line and write your EDC's price to compare on line 1. This price is given in cents per kilowatt-hour (kWh).
- 2 Call electric generation suppliers to find out what price they are offering for electric generation, or refer to the OCA's price list (see page 3). Write that price on line 2. See the check list at the back for other questions to ask suppliers.
- 3 For you to save, the supplier's price must be lower than your EDC's price to compare. Subtract the new supplier price from the EDC price to compare and write that number on line 3.
- 4 Write the average number of kilowatt-hours (kWh) your household uses in a month on line 4.
- 5 Multiply line 3 by line 4 and put that number on line 5.
- 6 Divide the subtotal by 100 to calculate your savings per month in dollars and cents (line 6).
- 7 Some suppliers charge a monthly fee in addition to the charge for generation. If the supplier charges a fee, write the amount on line 7. If the supplier does not charge a monthly fee, put a zero on line 7.
- 8 Subtract the monthly fee from your savings per month (line 7 from line 6) to find out what your "Final Monthly Savings" may be. Put that on line 8.

Is your price fixed or does it depend on time of day or usage?		
What is the length of the agreement?		
Is there a cancellation fee?		
Are there any other fees, such as a monthly service fee? (Enter monthly fee on line 7 of Comparison Worksheet)		
Will I receive one bill or two?		
Is there a bonus for signing up with you?		
Do you offer a choice of energy sources, such as renewable energy?		
Do you offer any other services?		
Contact name and phone number?		
Customer service hours?		
Monthly Savings? (Enter amount from line 8 of Comparison Worksheet)
